Understanding Safer Internet Day 2022

What is Safer Internet Day?



Safer Internet Day is an annual event which is taking place on 8th February 2022. It's a global celebration all about technology, looking at how children and young people can use the internet responsibly, respectfully, and creatively whilst making the most of their relationships online.



Safer Internet Day is a great opportunity to focus on online safety with the young people you work with – whether that's trying out some of the learning activities in this pack, holding an assembly or running an event. Your school or organisation could tell parents and carers about the day, support the campaign on social media, or you could ask young people to share their top tips for staying safe online.

The theme for Safer Internet Day 2021 is...







Safer Internet Day 2022 celebrates young people's role in creating a safer internet and the ways they are shaping the interactive entertainment spaces they are a part of. The platforms young people use are spaces for connection, community and collaboration, and the day challenges them to foster supportive relationships and respectful communities, whilst equipping them with the skills they need to keep themselves and others safe in these spaces.



Speaking with young people is key to exploring their experiences on platforms where they can play games, interact with their peers and others, and take part in 'live' experiences such as video streaming. These platforms play such an important and positive role, providing young people with the means to interact with friends and as a great pastime, particularly during the recent lockdowns in the UK.

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However, there are some emerging safety issues in these spaces as well as issues young people have been navigating for some time; particularly the lack of respect individuals display towards each other, groups 'ganging up' against other groups, and the sense that it is easy to 'get away' with negative behaviour such as unkindness, bullying and swearing. They speak about hate directed at some groups, particularly LGBT+, BAME and disabled users, and misogyny on gaming platforms. They tell us the apparent lack of consequences for negative behaviour has an impact on their safety and wellbeing.

We need to address these issues so that all young people understand what constitutes respectful behaviour online and that they know what to do if they encounter hate or bullying directed at them or someone else.



Who organises Safer Internet Day?

In the UK, Safer Internet Day is organised by the UK Safer Internet Centre (UKSIC), a partnership of three charities – Childnet International, the Internet Watch Foundation (IWF) and the South West Grid for Learning (SWGfL).


Invite parents and carers to get involved, whether that is attending an assembly or sending online safety activities home with learners.
